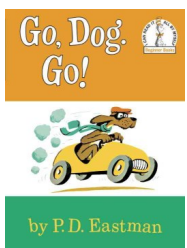

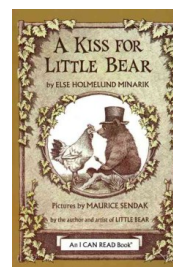

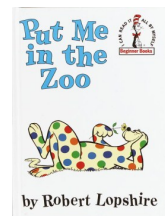

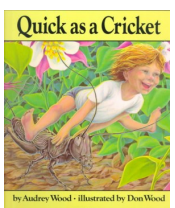

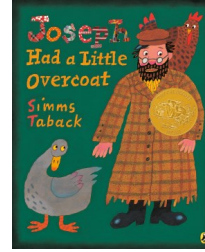

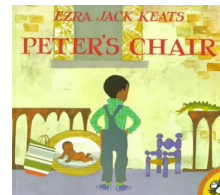

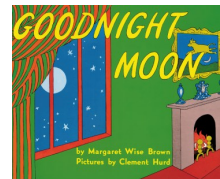

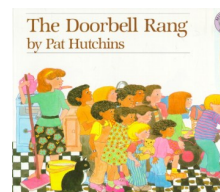


The Dot

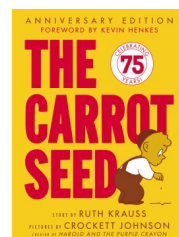
