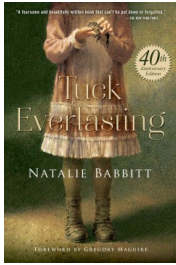

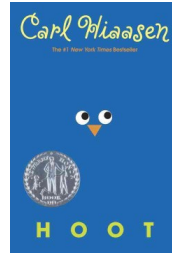


Tuck Everlasting

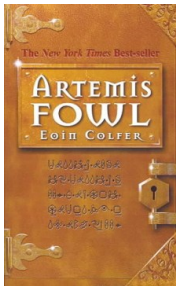


Hoot

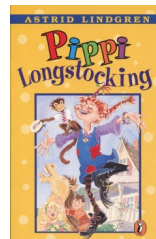


Artemis Fowl

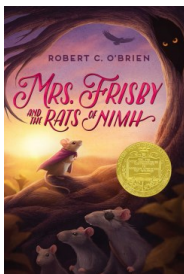

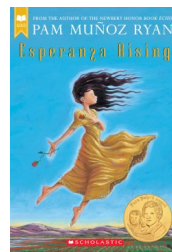

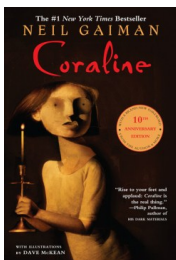


Esperanza Rising

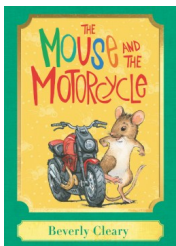


Moon over Manifest

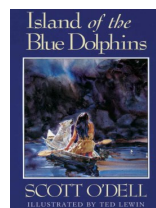


The Mouse and the Motorcycle

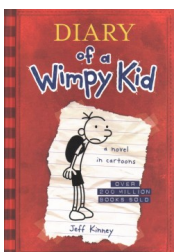
Island of the Blue Dolphins

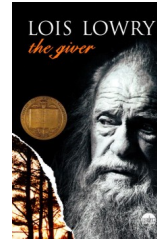


Hatchet

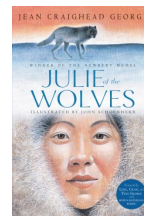
Tuesdays at the Castle

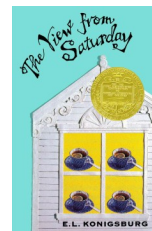


Julie of the Wolves

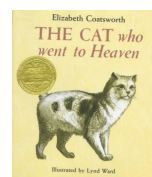


The View from Saturday

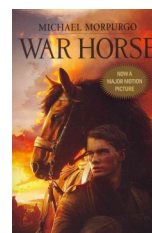


The Cat Who Went to Heaven
